

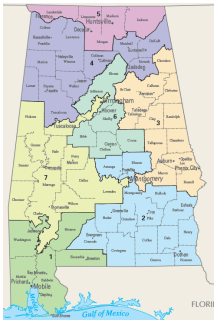


PRIME-ARY PERSPECTIVE: ALABAMA RUNOFF

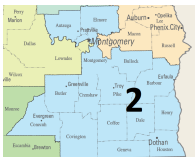

ALABAMA RUNOFF



A deep red state that was the site of one of the most unlikely Democratic Senate victories last year when Sen. Doug Jones (D) defeated Roy Moore (R). This year, there are not likely to be any such surprises, and there are not expected to be any competitive House races, although there was one runoff in one House race.

The seat is currently represented by Rep. Martha Roby (R), a four-term congresswoman. The district includes most of the Montgomery metropolitan area, and has a Cook PVI score of R+16.

Martha Roby (R)

Yesterday in Alabama's 2nd congressional district, nearly 70% of Republican runoff voters led incumbent Martha Roby to victory. Roby is a three-term congresswoman who has not shied away from critiquing President Trump, something that was viewed as potentially consequential in a district where the president is very popular. Unlike in the instance of Mark Sanford, President Trump did provide Roby an eleventh-hour endorsement despite her past chides, which-



in his words-opened the "flood gates" to a landslide victory. The district includes most of the Montgomery metropolitan area, and has a Cook PVI score of R+16. Roby will face Democrat Tabitha Isner in this safe Republican seat in November.

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
